Biographical Details



Amy Liptrot is a journalist and author, born and raised in Orkney. She received widespread critical acclaim for her debut book, The Outrun, an introspective on selfhood and place. In this memoir, the writer documents her dramatic reconnection with the land on her return home, as she seeks solace from her spiralling addictions. The Outrun won the 2016 Wainwright prize and 2017 Pen Ackerly award. A second memoir, The Instant, charted Liptrot's move away from Orkney to try and find contentment in Germany.

Contextualising



In its frank and compelling descriptions of troubling or defining life events, Amy Liptrot's creative nonfiction sits appropriately alongside alongside that of other Scottish contemporary writers such as Jackie Kay (Red Dust Road, 2010), John Burnside (A Lie About my Father 2006; Waking up in Toytown 2010) and Janice Galloway (This is Not About Me 2008; All Made Up 2011). It is closer stylistically, though, to Liptrot's Orcadian predecessor George Mackay Brown in his Orkney Tapestry (1969). Both celebrate the rich social and cultural history of the archipelago.
