Contextualising

The writing of Peter Ross foregrounds Scotland's places and spaces, its people, and its pastimes. Rather than focusing on Scottish stereotypes or clichés, Ross tries to seek out odd or archaic traditions, local heroes, curious characters, or strange spaces to explore and examine in his long-form essays. Ross is interested in heritage and culture, but his work often probes behind the scenes to find the authentic voices in Scottish arts, engineering, sports, and science. In so doing, Ross paints vivid and visceral portraits of Scotland.


Thinking about your chosen Peter Ross text, consider the following questions, geared towards checking understanding:
